Pilots to the Rescue, for a Rescue

Peppertree Rescue got a little help from the sky in June when “Pilots N Paws,” a group of volunteer pilots, jumped in to help rescue a German Shorthaired Pointer (GSP) from a small Michigan shelter by transporting her to the Capital District.

Hershey, a nine-year-old female GSP, was turned into the shelter after her family felt that she was “no longer useful because her hunting days were over,” according to longtime Peppertree volunteer Katie Muller who also works closely with GSP Rescue. The Michigan shelter had been hit hard by the economy, was full of dogs and was going to have to euthanize Hershey because of space constraints. Fortunately for Hershey, the shelter staff really liked her and reached out to GSP Rescue in Michigan. The GSP rescue was inundated with dogs and had no room so a volunteer posted Hershey online to spread the word about her plight. Our volunteer Katie read about Hershey and asked Peppertree to get involved, but knew that out-of-state transports can be difficult to arrange. The shelter agreed to give Hershey a couple of extra days until arrangements could be made to get her out of the shelter and transport her to New York State.

Never one to give up easily, Katie got in touch with a GSP volunteer who also helps coordinate flights for Pilots N Paws. The GSP volunteer offered to post a request for assistance to the online forum to see if any pilots might be willing to help Hershey. Once two

pilots offered assistance, she coordinated the flights needed to get Hershey to the Fulton County Airport in upstate New York. Katie said, “I have to say that was the easiest transport ever! Hershey flew to the little airport five minutes from my house. I brought the pilot’s wife over to Wendy’s to grab a hamburger and then we both headed home. I wasn’t even gone an hour!” It was Peppertree’s first experience with the Pilots N Paws program and coincidentally, it was also the pilots’ first experience with the program. It was a successful, rewarding venture for everyone involved in Hershey’s rescue.

Pilots N Paws, which was established in February 2008, recruits volunteer pilots to fly shelter animals to new homes to save them from euthanasia. The group estimates that it has rescued more than 2,000 animals since it began operations. Marti DeFronzo: A True “Peppertree Person”

Martie DeFronzo, who passed away in June, was one of Peppertree’s founders. In fact, this organization was officially “born” at a table in her lovely Hillsdale home on an incredibly snowy morning in December 1998. She was one of the five original members of the Board of Directors and even after she retired from the Board (we actually let her stay retired the second time), she was designated our “Board Member Emeritus” and she was always brought in on our most important, and most difficult, decisions. Although we’d seen too little of her in recent years when she became less active because of health problems, Martie was always at our heart and always there to reach out to for a bit

of sanity and humor. She will be tremendously, and deeply missed.

I met Martie in the fall of 1996 when I was with another Golden Retriever rescue organization and was sent to her house to do a home visit. I’ve rarely had so much fun and, quite frankly, I didn’t want to leave! Nor did Pepper, my dog who had accompanied me and decided – as many other four-footed creatures had before her and after that day – that she’d found Dog Heaven, one complete with a special, fun-loving and always warm and welcoming angel. I convinced Martie (sort of) that fostering was more fun than adopting and so she became a key volunteer, in that organization and later in Pep-



pertree Rescue. She and Roc provided a welcoming – and healing – foster home for so many dogs and, well, some of the very lucky dogs just didn’t leave. I never convinced her that fostering was always better

than adopting. In fact, I believe the term “foster failure” was first invented to apply to the DeFronzo household. It should be noted Roc, her husband, was not an entirely innocent bystander in all this foster-failing. However, none of the dogs who arrived at their home as a frightened foster and went on to become full-fledged DeFronzos ever thought the word “failure” applied to anything about their particular situation.

Martie adopted dogs of all types, usually some relation to a Golden, but she was responsible for even more intakes of what came to be known as a “DeFronzo special.” These were the “black Golden” that reminded her of her beloved Panda, a Newfie mix who had passed on shortly before we met. We used to start our stopwatches to measure the very short time between posting a picture of a Golden Retriever who just happened to be the wrong color and Martie’s inevitable response of “Yes, we should take him/her,” often followed by “and I’ll foster!” Ironically, the dog who most represented this type of dog, except for size, was the petite but powerful Cricket, a dog Martie actually adopted from another rescue group. Little Cricket earned a special place in Peppertree, however, as she helped Martie civilize and rehabilitate a great many foster dogs over the years. One of Martie’s daughters told us that Cricket was right by her side until the end.

The one thing we could never figure out about Martie’s dogs was that she typically had a large, happy, and congenial group of female dogs, while the rest of us were struggling with the conflicting personalities of two or more bitches, each of

whom wanted to be the boss and to send her sister(s) into the corner for misbehavior. Males are usually so much more easy-going and Martie did concede this eventually, but at Martie’s house, the girls always got along just fine. But, then, Martie had that same effect on people, too. Somehow – and I never fully understood – she always managed to give us perspective, to help us remember to keep the focus on the dogs, and to inject a little warmth and wisdom – and tolerance – into any situation. She wasn’t a “goody two-shoes” by any means – FAR more interesting than that and sometimes the humor had a delightfully wry and ribald edge to it! But to sit beside Martie at a clinic and talk a bit, or to get her on the phone about one thing but wander over into other topics, or to lean on her shoulder in order to vent and fuss and have her accept and understand but never to make a situation worse – these were pretty amazing experiences. I imagine over the many years there must have been times when she became irritated, or said something that was a bit harsh or cutting, but try as I might, I can’t recall any. What I, and others, remember are her sparkling eyes, the always-present and genuine half grin, and the warmth and acceptance with which she dealt with both the people and the dogs of Peppertree Rescue.

We will miss her very much – always. There is a tremendous emptiness knowing that she isn’t there to turn to. In fact, the only thought that offsets this sense of loss is imagining the fireworks and festivities that there must have been when she arrived on the other side, at the Rainbow Bridge.

A Dream Come True-

Peppertree is fortunate to have volunteers with varied talents and work experience. Not to mention volunteers with great generosity of spirit. A few months ago, Lynn Holcomb, who works for a GM dealer, was able to locate a beautiful white 2008 Chevrolet Express Van 1500 that was available for purchase. Peppertree Rescue was able to purchase it through the GMAC Smart auction, an online auction where GM dealers can purchase vehicles from other dealers, directly from GMAC, or from rental car companies without ever leaving the office. Drivers went to Pennsylvania to pick it up and brought it back to Randall Buick GMC in Canandaigua NY where Lynn works. Lynn assisted Peppertree with the insurance and paperwork and then personally delivered the van to Albany.

Peppertree has been dreaming of its own van for a very long time, instead of using volunteers' personal vehicles some of which had over 200,000 miles, many of those miles accumulated during dog transport. The car manners of Peppertree dogs can be quite varied, and volunteers have been known to lose things like seatbelts, and sometimes whole seats to un-kenneled car riders. Additionally, for the money Peppertree could afford, finding a van in good enough condition was difficult until an anonymous donor, a long-time and steadfast friend of Peppertree, stepped forward.



The van is used to transport dogs to and from clinics at least twice a month and to schlep

around the various supplies needed for these clinics. The van is still being outfitted, inside and out, which is also due to generous donations. Inside the van will be equipped with a Havaheart trap in the event that dogs get loose during a transport, and the outside is being decaled with a donated graphic so the van and the organization are easily identified and recognized.

The van has been christened the "Toppermobile" in memory of the son of Peppertree Rescue's namesake Pepper, a Golden Retriever named Topper.

In addition to the anonymous donor, thank you to all who donate to Peppertree Rescue, as the general financial health of the organization also made this purchase possible without sacrificing the number of dogs Peppertree can assist, or the care they receive.
