The John Davis Fund for Senior Dogs



Peppertree Rescue finds homes for many older dogs and now has a special fund dedicated for that purpose, thanks to the generosity of a special donor. Paige Davis recently adopted a senior dog through Peppertree
Rescue, and decided to help
other dogs by creating the John Davis Fund for Senior



Dogs in memory of her late husband and their beloved senior rescue dogs Bronco and Stallion. Paige told us that "she wanted to do something in John's memory to keep his name alive. The Fund is something that he would be proud of, and it would have made him happy because he adored both dogs."

In January 1996 Paige and her husband John decided that they would like to adopt a dog that needed a home. They already had a beagle named Chance, but John wanted to adopt a golden retriever. He never had one before, but always liked the neighbor's golden retriever. Paige agreed with his choice, but she convinced him to get an older dog because she wanted to provide a home for a dog that would be hard to place. Paige felt a special affinity for older dogs because she enjoyed caring for senior citizens, and worked in the activities department of a local nursing home.

It took Paige and John a couple of months to find the special dog they were looking for. In March 1996, they noticed a Times Union classified ad about golden retrievers

in need of homes. They contacted the rescue group, Golden Retriever Rescue Operated With Love Statewide (GRROWLS), and were quickly matched up with Bronco, a 14-year-old male golden retriever who happened to be the oldest dog in need of placement. The only catch was that Bronco had a special companion, a nine-year-old male golden retriever named Stallion, and GRROWLS volunteers hoped that they would not have to be separated.

Bronco and Stallion were like brothers. They had lived together nearly all of their lives after their owner rescued them from a Long Island shelter. GRROWLS had been trying to find the pair a home for several months. Their owner was moving to the Midwest on short notice and could not take them with her so she asked GRROWLS to help her rather than putting them in a shelter. She was very worried about them being separated, but understood that there would be little chance of finding anyone to take both dogs because of their age and size. She asked that they be kept together for as long as possible until they could adjust to the new changes.

Paige and John had planned to adopt only one dog, Bronco. When they arrived at the home of a GRROWLS volunteer to

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samstel@nycap.rr.com rwnw3@aol.com meet him and take him home, they also met Stallion. The volunteer asked them if they would consider fostering Stallion for a short time to help both dogs adjust to the transition. They agreed to take Stallion home for a temporary stay, but fell in love and decided to keep him too.

The two dogs were featured together in the 1999 GRROWLS calendar. In retrospect, Paige cannot imagine having separated Bronco and Stallion because they were so close. Recently she told us, "They were such great dogs and became part of the family immediately. They were very happy and devoted to us, and John and I were devoted to them." In fact, John was so happy with both goldens that he convinced Paige to buy an eight-week-old golden retriever puppy from a reputable breeder. Teddy the puppy used to curl up next to Bronco and Stallion like they were his parents. Bronco was especially close to Teddy and used to play with him daily. It was quite a sight to see a 100-pound dog wrestling with a golden retriever puppy in their backyard. Bronco was like a gentle giant. He always had to have a tennis ball in his mouth and sometimes fell asleep with it there. Bronco was a little more independent than Stallion was, but was just as devoted. Whenever they left the dogs in the car during outings, Bronco always would sit in the driver's seat to wait for them.

Stallion had a disfigured front leg that had been injured sometime before he had been adopted from the shelter. The injury had never been properly cared for so he held his leg up to the side and never used it. After Paige and John adopted him, their veterinarian recommended amputating the leg because it was so heavy and bothersome to Stallion. Fortunately, Stallion's surgery was paid for by the GRROWLS Uncle Sherman Fund, which helps to offset medical costs for senior dogs. John had had cancer in his leg so he also was handicapped and walked with a limp. Paige believes that John and Stallion's leg handicaps gave them a special bond. Stallion was very devoted and was the kind of dog who would do anything for you. He followed Paige everywhere and she admits that Stallion became her special baby.

Ironically, John, Bronco and Stallion all passed away in 2000. John died in March, Stallion died in May at the age of 13, and Bronco died in October at the age of 18.

Despite her tremendous personal losses, Paige refused to let John's legacy of kindness and love die. By November she already had decided to open up her heart and home to another senior dog. After contacting Peppertree Rescue, she brought home Goldie, a 12-year-old female golden retriever. The next month she approached Peppertree Rescue about starting a memorial fund for senior dogs to pay tribute to her late husband and the two dogs that he loved so much. Paige decided to create the memorial fund through Peppertree Rescue because she had kept in touch with two former GRROWLS volunteers who later founded Peppertree.

The John Davis Fund for Senior Dogs provides a source of emergency reserves for senior dogs. According to Peppertree Rescue President Betsy Sommers, "The John Davis Fund allows us to accept seniors into the program as readily as we do younger dogs. If we accept an older dog and then run into problems, or if we know at the outset that an intake is going to require more care than we can afford at that moment, we can still help that senior dog because we can turn to the Fund. The Fund has allowed us to accept many more seniors than we would have been able to do otherwise. Since its inception, the Fund has helped, either directly or indirectly, 27 dogs aged eight and above."

Paige has three dogs at home with her now, including her 13-year-old beagle Chance, five-year-old Teddy, and 14-yearold Goldie. She attended a Peppertree Rescue clinic recently and plans to keep in touch with our volunteers. She wants her husband to be remembered for his kindness and generosity, and hopes that the John Davis Fund for Senior Dogs will help older dogs that need and deserve a loving and caring home. Her dream is to encourage individuals to adopt senior dogs that, despite their years, still have so much love to give. She hopes that others will support that goal by adopting a senior dog and contributing to the Fund.

Peppertree Rescue's website has a new page dedicated to the John Davis Fund for Senior Dogs. Individuals interested in targeting donations to senior dogs can donate through the website link or specify the Fund when making a contribution by mail or at one of our many clinics.

and is available for adoption and bookings, through Jean & John Balint. The capes were a wonderful way to spot some of the great dogs still looking for a family




of their own. Courtney, thank you.
